

## **Preparation/Use**

Rosehips (fruit) are eaten raw or prepared as tea, syrups, or other forms that can be strained to remove irritating hairs inside the fruit. Rose petals are distilled with water, and the resulting rose water is used in food. When making Baklava, rose water is sprayed in between layers of Phyllo dough. What a romantic dessert! Rose oil is a very popular essential oil due to its fragrance and topical uses.

## Phytochemistry

Rosehips contain significant levels of Vitamin C, beta-Carotene, essential fatty acids, and pectin. Rose petals contain aroma compounds such as  $\beta$ -Phenyl ethyl alcohol, citronellol, eugenol, geraniol, linalool, and rose oxide. Rosehip seed oil is shown to have antioxidant activity.

## **Botanical Characteristics**

Shrubs; stems climbing or procumbent, with prickles (not thorns); leaves membranous or leathery; flower color variable; fruit (hips) red or orange-red, purplish red, or purplish

black, fleshy or leathery.
